

TEACHING METHODS Fishbowl

MATERIALS NEEDED FOR IN-PERSON TEACHING:

 SEATS CAN BE MOVED THROUGHOUT THE ROOM

MATERIALS NEEDED FOR VIRTUAL TEACHING:

SPOTLIGHT OR "PIN"
 FEATURE IN THE
 VIRTUAL CLASSROOM

EMPOWERING LEARNING:

- STUDENT CENTERED
- GIVES SPACE FOR INTROVERTS
- ENCOURAGES ACTIVE LISTENING AND ENGAGEMENT

DESCRIPTION

In a medium to large class, this type of discussion highlights one small group of students as they carry the conversation while other groups can only listen and take notes. After 10-15 minutes, the groups switch roles and the formerly highlighted group then listens as the next group discusses.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR IN-PERSON TEACHING

Arrange the space so that the group speaking is the focus. The term "fishbowl" comes from a typical arrangement of a small group of seats within a larger circle of chairs. When the groups switch roles, then also switch seats.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR VIRTUAL TEACHING

- 1. Utilize features like Zoom's "Spotlight" that can pin the small group of students speaking to the front of everyone's view.
- 2. Make sure everyone outside of the small speaking group is muted and not using the chat until it is their time to be spotlighted

IDEAS FOR USING THIS METHOD

- Set open-ended questions for discussion
- Bunch the strongest voices of the class in the same group: this will prevent small group discussion from being dominated and gives them the opportunity to listen to voices they might otherwise speak over
- Debrief afterwards, e.g. how did participants feel discussing and how did they feel listening?
