INSTRUCTIONS FOR IN-PERSON TEACHING

*Prepare for this intimate time by reading your favorite scripture, sitting quietly and clearing your mind of all the distractions, focus only on your breathing *Select an image - religious, nature, abstract * Gaze at whatever part of that image stands out to you * Close your eyes and "see" that section of the image that stood out to you * Give yourself permission to "sit" with the image for a minute or two * Open your eyes. What is God saying, showing you? * Pray for clarity around that piece of the image or whatever comes into your spirit. What emotions are coming up for you? Ask for guidance. Talk with God while looking at the image. * Write notes or draw your thoughts and feelings. Thank God for blessing this sacred time.
